A Word from the Department Chairs

It is our pleasure to present the WU Department of Economics and provide a selected overview of the department's 2019 activities in this brochure.

2019 was a very important year for our department. We successfully implemented the first growth phase in a long time, carefully and prudently expanding to improve the standing of the Department of Economics at WU as a respected and internationally visible research institution. This included establishing two new professorships with a focus on the study of digitalization, one in microeconomics and one in macroeconomics. We also hired two outstanding junior faculty members who will soon start their (tenure-track) positions. These additions to the department will further strengthen our competence at the core of economics while broadening our expertise to cover highly relevant and future-oriented areas of economic research.

The growth of our department is a reflection of the ongoing success of our educational programs. The economics specializations in WU's bachelor programs (WiSo and BBE) and our internationally oriented, two-year Master's Program in

Economics offer a broad range of methodological courses in theoretical and quantitative economics, as well as topical courses on subjects at the cutting edge of current research and policy debates. Our students explore an extremely broad set of applications and leave well-prepared for numerous academic and most occupational fields for economists, both in Austria and abroad. Our efforts are rewarded with high and constantly growing demand. The department also enriches WU's course catalogue with a range of tailor-made economics courses, including for master programs on the digital economy, law, management, business education and socioeconomics.

In 2019, we continued amplifying our internationalization strategy to maintain and increase internal and external visibility through presence and excellence in research. In one major step, we harmonized our hiring procedures for junior faculty members with international job market practices. The department's excellent

reputation is also reflected in rankings (most recently 12th in the Handelsblatt list of the best economics faculties in German-speaking countries), as well as in the ongoing research output summarized in this report.

2019 also marked the start of our PhD Program in Economics. The 'new' PhD is a structured program that follows international guidelines and is characterized by rigorous coursework, a strong research element, and our ambition to place students at recognized international institutions. Incoming students are typically offered a five-year financial package. The program opens up opportunities for students on the international research frontier and prepares them for research-oriented careers in economics.

There were a lot of personnel and organizational changes in 2019 as well. Among other notable achievements, the department would like to congratulate Florian Szücs on his venia legendi (habilitation) in

economics and Melis Kartal, whose contract has been upgraded to a tenure-track position in behavioral and organizational economics. We would like to take this opportunity to welcome Esther Arenas Arroyo, who joined the department in a tenure-track position in labor economics, and Gergeley Hajdu and Hendrik Theine, who both joined the department as postdoctoral researchers. René Böheim, our long-standing and loyal guest professor of labor economics, returned to his home university. We thank you, René, for your excellent contributions as a teacher, supervisor and researcher.

Finally, we would like to express our gratitude to everyone who contributed to all that we achieved in 2019, as you will read in this annual report.

Nachruf

em. Univ. Prof. Dr. Dr. med. Anton Schöpf

Am 26. Oktober 2019 ist em. Univ. Prof. Dr. Dr. med. Anton Schöpf nach langem, mit großer Geduld ertragenem Leiden im 90. Lebensjahr verstorben. Der Lebensweg und die akademische Laufbahn von Anton Schöpf sind durch bemerkenswerte Wendepunkte, ausgelöst durch ernste Erkrankungen, gekennzeichnet.

Anton Schöpf wurde am 17. Februar 1930 in Wien geboren. Er absolvierte das Studium an der damaligen Hochschule für Welthandel (Diplomkaufmann 1955 und Doktorat 1960). Seine wissenschaftliche Laufbahn begann er an der Hochschule für Welthandel als Assistent und habilitierte sich 1965 für Volkswirtschaftslehre. 1969 wurde er zum Professor für Finanzwissenschaft an der Hochschule für Welthandel berufen. 1970 gründete er das Institut für Finanzwissenschaft, leitete es von 1970 bis 1992 und emeritierte 1998.

Anton Schöpf vertrat – von der disziplinären Tradition abweichend – eine breite volkswirtschaftliche Sicht von Finanzwissenschaft. Als Ökonom und ausgebildeter praktischer Arzt war ihm die Verbindung ökonomischer Grundlagen mit zentralen Themen der Gesundheitspolitik und der Hinweis auf die notwendige Berücksichtigung von ökologischen Aspekten ein besonderes Anliegen. Besonders verdient gemacht hat sich Anton Schöpf durch die langjährige wissenschaftliche Leitung der Krankenhausverwalterausbildung in ganz Österreich.

Mit Anton Schöpf ist ein außergewöhnlicher Mensch und engagierter Universitätslehrer von uns gegangen. Wir werden ihm stets ein ehrendes Andenken bewahren.





2019 WU Lecture in Economics

WU Matters. WU Talks. Economics and human motivation: Charles Darwin meets Adam Smith and Immanuel Kant.
(December 18, 2019) Keynote speaker: Jörgen Weibull

This year's keynote speaker, Jörgen Weibull from the University of Stockholm, gave a lecture summarizing recent work on an alternative to homo economicus. Harald Badinger (Vice-Rector for Financial Affairs, WU) and Ulrich Berger (Department of Economics) opened the lecture.

The title hints at an interesting and surprising connection between evolution,

economics, and moral philosophy that Jörgen Weibull and Ingela Alger discovered a few years ago – a topic that is very relevant today. For many years, mainstream economics has been accused of relying on fundamentally incorrect assumptions about human behavior encapsulated in the rational and selfish homo economicus. Behavioral economics has responded with a variety of theoretical models that typically retain

the rationality assumption while replacing selfishness with social preferences of some kind. This approach is still based on the conventional assumption that preferences are exogenously given. Weibull and research partner Ingela Alger went an important step further and explored where preferences come from. They turned to Darwinian evolution as an explanation and built a very general model of the evolution of preferences. Surprisingly, they found that evolved human motivations present themselves

as a mixture of selfishness, morality, and a little bit of envy, where the morality element resembles Kant's categorical imperative. These "competitive moralists" can be identified in laboratory experiments with human subjects. In his talk, Jörgen Weibull explored the implications these types of motivations have on economic behavior and economic policy.
