Scope and Objective

The **Digital Economy Taxation Network** (DET) was established in August 2017 as a multi-stakeholder initiative to provide a platform for discussions among governments, businesses, international and regional organizations, and academia. It also aims to conduct policy-relevant research on taxation issues arising from the digitalized economy, with a particular focus on the medium-term potential of these technologies to transform tax systems.

The DET Network brings together leaders and leading research institutions from around the world engaged in cutting-edge research on the implications of the digital economy for tax policy, taxpayers, and tax administrations. Its goal is to maximize opportunities while minimizing risks associated with digitalization. The strength of the DET Network lies in the diversity of institutions under its umbrella, encompassing a wide range of expertise and scientific research areas.
